WE WILL WIN CRIME FIGHT - PM GOLDING

Prime Minister Bruce Golding has vowed to continue the fight against crime despite his administration's failure to win support for an extension of the state of emergency from the opposition.



He said the government will be rolling out six new crime bills recently passed in parliament as well as bolstering the resources available to the security forces in order to dismantle criminal networks and restore public confidence.

In a televised broadcast to the nation on July 21, PM Golding said: "The non-extension of the state of emergency is a setback, but the battle can be won, must be won and will be won. We must continue the battle. We cannot allow the gains that have been made over the past two months to be lost. Too much is at stake. There is a sense of relief and growing confidence that many people throughout Jamaica have felt in recent times. No matter what obstacles are placed in our way, we cannot return to a situation where people were constantly fearful and frightened."

A total of 4,181 persons were detained, under the emergency act, from May 24-July 14. Three thousand, four hundred and eighty-five persons were processed and released. Golding said the police and army needed more time to lay their hands on criminals. The prime minister told the nation that the state of emergency has achieved a critical goal: "The criminal elements have been shaken and they are on the run."

The emergency regulations empowered the security forces to sweep through communities in St Catherine and the Corporate Area and detain persons, without warrant or charge, for up to 30 days.

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NEWS IN BRIEF

Govt. committed to Diaspora



Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, Hon. Dr. Kenneth Baugh, has said that engagement of the Jamaican Diaspora will continue to remain an important priority for the Jamaican Government. Speaking during

the 2010/11 Sectoral Debate in Parliament on Tuesday July 13, he informed that the period 2009/10 had been marked by steady progress in the Government's engagement with Jamaicans overseas.

He said that although the scheduled biennial Jamaican Diaspora Conference for 2010 was postponed, ongoing discussions continued with all stakeholders with the aim to agree on a new date.

"In keeping with mandates arising from the first Jamaica Diaspora Conference in 2004, significant progress has been made in developing the structures and mechanisms to enable the Jamaican Diaspora to contribute meaningfully to national development," he stated.

Shaw talks investment in London

Minister of Finance and the Public Service, Hon. Audley Shaw, led the charge for foreign direct investment into Jamaica, at a Jamaica-UK Investment Forum, held the Mandarin Oriental Hotel in London, in March.



Buoyed by the success of the recent debt exchange

programme, he assured investors of the administration's commitment to achieving financial sector reform and stability, outlining the macro-economic framework within which the policies and initiatives to drive the productive sector are being developed. Minister Shaw drew plaudits from the audience for the debt exchange programme, which has had a 99.2 per cent success rate.

Bartlett leads repair effort



Minister of Tourism Hon. Edmund Bartlett led an international promotional drive in June to try and prevent a fallout in Jamaica's tourism sector following the unrest in West Kingston. Minister Bartlett visited New York, London and Toronto

to reassure the market that Jamaica was open for business and safe for visitors. He took the message to mainstream media and the Diaspora.

JAMAICA JOINS WORSHIPFUL TRADE ASSOCIATION

Declaring that Jamaica was in the business of business, Jamaican High Commissioner to the United Kingdom Anthony Johnson commended the decision of the government's trade and investment promotions agency, JAMPRO, to become a member of the Worshipful Company of World Traders.

At a reception hosted by JAMPRO, Mr Johnson noted that the world of business was always chang-

ing, and that it was important to recognise changes that are taking place and to make certain not to miss out on opportunities of the present.

The High Commissioner commended the London-based Worshipful Company of World Traders for their interest in Jamaica and outlined some of Jamaica's business and investor friendly initiatives, such as the development of the port of Kingston and the island's two international airports. High Commissioner Johnson also spoke of the unmatchable quality of Jamaican produce, such as ginger, Lignum Vitae wood, logwood and coconuts.

It only accepts members from the international trade fraternity, with the aim of raising awareness and understanding of world trade.

'JAMAICA ABSOLUTELY' LAUNCHED IN LONDON

A new coffee table guide to Jamaica by Hansib Publications, titled 'Jamaica Absolutely', had its United Kingdom launch recently at the Jamaican High Commission in London.

Jamaica Absolutely features the work and essays of more than 30 writers and photographers, and includes articles and photographs by the Jamaica Information Service. In addition to a range of

articles on Jamaica's history, people and culture, the book also features

individual profiles on all fourteen parishes. The volume has been described as a rich mixture of text and photographs.

At the launch, hosted by the Jamaica Tourist Board, Jamaica Absolutely's editor Arif Ali said the book was inspired by Evon Black's Beautiful Jamaica. Mr. Ali said that the fifteen months it took to put together the book was



a commitment of 'love and pleasure', and said he was proud that Jamaica Absolutely was used by the Jamaican government as a promotional tool at the Shanghai Expo in China. Jamaica Absolutely was supported by the Jamaica Tourist Board and is the twenty-first book in Hansib's 'Nations Series'.

UK Jamaicans urged to invest in businesses

More Jamaicans in the United Kingdom need to become involved in businesses in order for the community to advance economically.

This is the view of Jamaican High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, His Excellency Anthony Johnson. Noting that it was one area where the Jamaican community needed to be better represented, the High Commissioner has urged UK-based Jamaicans to become more involved in starting and operating businesses.

Speaking in Leeds in mid-July Mr Johnson urged the Jamaican community to sponsor and support its members in starting business operations.

Mr. Johnson said that the Jamaican community in the UK has been a part of the mainstream and had been successful in fields of academia, athletics, cricket, football, music and religious affairs. The last hurdle to be overcome, he said was business.

"The Jamaican community in the United Kingdom has been apart of the mainstream and involved and engaged in every aspect of the society. However we need to be involved to a greater extent in mainstream businesses", Mr. Johnson said.

Mr. Johnson was speaking at Jamaica House, headquarters of the Jamaica Society Leeds, during the final session of a week-end visit to the northern city.

"Many of the vicious gunmen who will take your life without batting an eye are in hiding; they are not yet behind bars. Most of the guns have been hidden; they have not yet been taken away," Golding said.

He added: "In going forward, the police and the military will need to rely even more heavily on the support and cooperation of the public in providing information on where the criminals are hiding, where the guns are hidden."

The prime minister said the Government has secured the cooperation of the courts and the DPP (director of public prosecutions) in fasttracking the trial of cases involving serious crimes and high-profile offenders.

JAMAICAN COMPANY DONATES FUNDS TO SUPPORT AFFECTED WEST KINGSTON RESIDENTS

Mr. Paul Brown, Mrs. Veronica Bailey Coke, and Mrs. Kerrie Ann Coke-Wynter of Dorcas Home Care Limited set an example for the Jamaican Diaspora in early June when they donated £1,000 (JA\$130,000) to provide humanitarian relief to those affected by the unrest in Tivoli Gardens and Western Kingston.

The directors of the Jamaican-owned, Birmingham-based company presented a cheque to Jamaican High Commissioner Anthony Johnson, and encouraged others to do the same.

Mr. Brown said that his actions were motivated by a concern that many 'law abiding' citizens had lost personal effects during the unrest. He told the High Commissioner that the company wanted to help residents of West Kingston get back on their feet as quickly as possible.



High Commissioner Johnson expressed his gratitude, adding that the government would be appreciative of any outside assistance or support.

Dorcas Home Care Limited provides residential care for the elderly and operates three centres across Birmingham. Its directors also own a trucking and haulage company in Jamaica, and are in the process of setting up a care home in Gregory Park, St. Catherine.

Jamaican appointed Mayor of Rugby



Jamaican-born Don Williams was appointed Mayor of the mid-England town of Rugby in May. Mr Williams is the town's first black mayor. He said he hoped to use his one-year term to improve integration in the town and its environs and to raise awareness of sickle cell disease.

"We have come a long way in terms of integration. This is one of the towns where people of all nationalities live together and share the community spirit. We have worked long and hard to build and maintain good relations and we will continue to do so. I hope to sensitise the wider community to the impact of sickle cell disease on the black community."

Mayor Williams hails from the district of Aboukir in St Ann. He came to the United Kingdom in 1957 and worked as a tailor. He became an active member of civil society and led numerous community initiatives on behalf of the West Indian community. He first entered the council 10 years ago and has

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been re-elected on four occasions.

Jamaican High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, His Excellency Anthony Johnson congratulated Mr Williams on his appointment.

He said: "It is good to see Jamaicans excelling, as we normally do. Here in the heartlands of England we have a Jamaican who came here as a tailor and has been able to work his way through the system to get to the top of his town's administration. It is highly commendable and it is also significant that of the 38 councillors in the chamber, he is the only one of Afro Caribbean descent. You could tell from the speeches given by his fellow councillors that they think very highly of him. I wish him well and I know that he will have a great tour of duty."

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HIGH COMMISSIONER WELCOMES HOME JAMAICA LIGHTNING BOLT

Jamaican High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, Anthony Johnson and his wife Mrs. Pamela Johnson were special guests at a welcome home event for the crew of the Jamaica Lightning Bolt yacht when they arrived back in Hull, England, at the end of the Clipper 09-10 Round the World Yacht Race on Saturday July 17.

The return to the Hull Marina marked the end of a 10-month, 35,000-mile race against nine other yachts. Jamaica Lightning Bolt claimed fifth place in the final line-up, sharing equal points with the fourth-placed Hull & Humber but narrowly beaten due to the number of legs won during the race.

High Commissioner Johnson, who congratulated the crew, said the reception for Jamaica Lightning Bold was tremendous. He said he hoped there would be an opportunity for Jamaica to again be a part of the international race and that a Jamaican will be a part of the crew.

Jamaica Lightning Bolt was sponsored by the Jamaica Tourist Board and named in honour of the world's fastest man, Usain Bolt. Bolt sent a message of congratulations to the crew members: "Great work by Jamaica Lightning Bolt for making it to the finish line! 10 months and 35,000 miles that's a very long and enduring race! By my checks, you'd be pushing 40 seconds for the 100 meters at that pace, but I'm sure that's faster than I could swim! It's been an absolute honour to have my name attached to such a great team," the message



said

High Commissioner Johnson was pleased with the positive feedback Port Antonio received from the crews of Jamaica Lightning Bolt and the rest of the Clipper boats who stopped in Jamaica at the end of leg six of the race, in May 2010.

Crew members from all the yachts, said that the island had provided one of the most enjoyable stops and warmest welcomes of all the world ports on the route. They also praised the reception and activities organized by Jamaica Tourist Board.

Sir Robin Knox-Johnston, the founder of the race and the first person to sail solo, non-stop around the world, thanked the Jamaica Tourist Board for its support in sponsoring the race.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS RETURNING RESIDENTS PROGRAMME

How do I qualify for concessions

A. You must be a Jamaican national who is at least 18 years old, have lived abroad for more than three consecutive years and intends to return to Jamaica to live permanently.

What documents should I submit in order to obtain the duty concessions?

- The following are necessary: Α.

- tax returns;
- retirement papers;
- c) d) utility bills: proof of property acquired/ rented e)

Q. sions?

Yes. Students who have studied for more than one year but less than three (3) years are entitled to concessions in terms of their tools of trade and some personal and household effects.

What are personal and household

effects? A. These are personal items of cloth-ing, toiletries, furniture and household appliances whether new or used.

What are tools of trade?

A. They are the type and amount of instruments, tools, equipment, devices and machinery used in the normal course and scope of a person's profession, trade or oc-

Q. What is the procedure for the clear-ance of unaccompanied baggage?

A. You will need to attend an interview at the Returning Residents Unit of Customs Department located at Customs House, Newport East Collector of Customs

Take along the requisite documents. Personal and household effects, as well as tools of trade are then inspected.

Q. Can duty concessions be obtained on my personal and household effects prior to arrival in Jamaica?

A. No. Concessions are granted only after the interview with officials of the Returning Resident Unit of the Customs Department.

What type of vehicle can I import? You may import a motor car and a light commercial unit or two light commercial units.

There are no distinctions between Jamaicans who reside in Jamaica and those who reside abroad, with respect to the ad-ministration of the Government's motor vehicle policy. In this regard, no duty concessions are granted to Returning Residents.

Q. Is there an age limit for the importa-tion of used motor vehicles?

Yes. Used motor cars should not be more than three (3) years old and light commercial vehicles should not be more than four (4) years old.

Q. What documents should I submit in order to import a motor vehicle?

A. The documents include a pro forma invoice, certificate of title or registration, tax-payer registration number (TRN) card, copy of two forms of ID, that is driver's licence, passport or electoral identification card.

Is there a limit on the quantity of

A. Yes. The Customs Department has published a list of the quantity of items which may be imported duty free. The list is contained in the Information Booklet for Returning Residents which is available at the High Commission and on this website www. ihcuk.com .

BOWES PUNCHES FOR JAMAICA

British-born boxer Phillip Bowes is looking forward to representing Jamaica at the London 2012 Olympic Games. Bowes, who earlier this month fought for Jamaica at the CAC Games in Puerto Rico said he's delighted to be representing Jamaica and hopes to win a gold medal for the country at the Commonwealth Games in India, in October.

The 25-year-old, who was on the island to compete in the 'Hands of Gold Fight Series' on May 29, was left disappointed after the Jamaica Boxing Board of Control was forced to postpone the card due to the upsurge in violence which led to the initial limited State of Emergency in the Corporate Area.

He told reporters: "I came to qualify for Jamaica , but the 'Hands of Gold' fight card wasn't possible due to the State of Emergency. I feel very privileged to have been selected because my immediate aspirations are to box for Jamaica."

Of future competitions he said: "I don't know how tough it's going to be, but I'm always expecting tough opponents and whatever comes my way I'll just have to assess the situation. I'm always running and I'm always training and I've been active, so I'm in good shape."



ASAFA POWELL TO LEAD JAMAICAN CHARGE AT CRYSTAL PALACE



Former world record holder Asafa Powell will lead a contingent of Jamaican athletes at the Samsung Diamond League athletics meet at Crystal Palace in London on August 13 and 14.

Olympic and World champion Usain Bolt who was earlier slated to headline the athletics carnival pulled out for economic reasons.

Jamaican athletes generally do very well at the meet which attracts thousands of flag-waving Jamaican supporters from across London.

As competition intensifies in the Diamond League season, Powell will be seeking to maintain his lead in the 100 metres event but could face a strong challenge from American Tyson Gay who beat him at the line in Gateshead in early July.
